# Senior Career Highlights

2024:

• July: At 61 years old, Ni Xia Lian competed in her sixth Olympic Games at the Paris 2024 Summer Olympics. She won her first-round match against Sibel Altinkaya of Turkey, becoming the oldest table tennis player to win a match at the Olympics.

# 2021:

• November: Secured a bronze medal in Women's Doubles at the World Table Tennis Championships in Houston, Texas, partnering with Sarah De Nutte. At 58, she became the oldest medalist in the history of the championships.













#### 2019:

• June: Qualified for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games by competing at the European Games in Minsk, Belarus, demonstrating her enduring competitiveness on the international stage.

## 2013:

• At the 2013 Games of the Small States of Europe, Ni Xia Lian, alongside her partner Sarah de Nutte, secured the gold medal in the Women's Doubles event. Additionally, the Luxembourg women's team, featuring Ni Xia Lian, Sarah de Nutte, and Tessy Gonderinger, clinched the gold medal in the Team event.

• August: Clinched the gold medal in Women's Singles at the European Table Tennis Championships in Zagreb, Croatia, reaffirming her dominance in European table tennis.

• June: Won a silver medal in Women's Doubles at the European Table Tennis Championships in Bremen, Germany, partnering with Peggy Regenwetter.

#### 1998:
